What is the New Orleans Service Immersion?

Approximately 50 MBA students, faculty, and staff will travel to New Orleans in January 2008 to pursue student led, team-based projects focused on reconstructing and rebuilding the business, educational, and community infrastructure in and around New Orleans following the destruction caused by Hurricane Katrina.

Student teams will be supplemented by pre-, during, and post-trip faculty led seminars and work closely with faculty members as they engage the challenges in New Orleans.

This will be the third year members of the Harvard Business School community have traveled to New Orleans to support the rebuilding efforts.

Outstanding Feedback

Students loved the trip

- > 50% of respondents rated the trip as a “10” (“Excellent”) on a 10 point scale
- 100% rated the experience as a 7 (“Good”) or higher

People liked the trip so much, they want to return

- 100% wanted to see the trip offered again this year
- ~90% of RCs expect to attend again this year

All-Inclusive Estimated Trip Costs – 2 potential scenarios

1

Cost = ~\$1000

1. **8 nights of hotels for free, 2 paid**
 - Double occupancy
2. **Meals, activities, transportation**
 - HBS contributing substantial funds for seminars, opening/closing events
 - SA contributing funds for transportation
 - Assumes ~\$50/day for meals
3. **Airfare (~\$300)**
4. **Does not include personal expenses**

2

Cost = ~\$2000

1. **10 nights of hotels**
 - Double occupancy
2. **Meals, activities, transportation**
 - HBS contributing substantial funds for seminars, opening/closing events
 - SA contributing funds for transportation
 - Assumes ~\$50/day for meals
3. **Airfare (~\$300)**
4. **Does not include personal expenses**

Financial Aid

Supplemental Immersion financial aid is available

Could be loans, fellowship, or a mix of loans and fellowship

Available to eligible MBA students but not to travel partners

Financial aid applicants must already have a complete HBS financial aid application on file before applying for supplemental Immersion aid

Estimated maximum amount of financial aid offered for the New Orleans Service Immersion will be \$1,700

- i. \$1,300 (student fee for double occupancy room)**
- ii. \$400 (airfare)**
